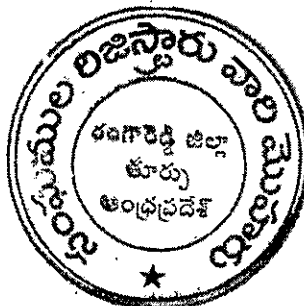





At one level, as the reach of English Premier League Football and UEFA Champions' League and commercialisation of Olympic Games show, modern professional sport has grown into a multibillion-dollar competitive enterprise that is truly global in nature. At the same time, as evident from the USSR-USA sparring in Olympics and Glasgow Rangers-Celtic and Real Madrid-FC Barcelona rivalries in football, sport is increasingly assuming immensely significant political and cultural meaning as an instrument of popular culture as evident from the rivalries. Indeed, A Blake writes: "sport is a crucial component of contemporary society; one very important way through which many of us understand our bodies, our minds and the rest of the world...sport saturates the language that surrounds us." Critically for lawyers, the new avatar of modern sport implicates a plethora of legal issues concerning contracts, labour and employment rights, administrative law and criminal law among a host of others.</p> <p>In this proposed Course, we shall briefly discuss the nature and meaning of this evolution of sport into a gigantic global enterprise and examine many of regulatory concerns related to it. BRIEF DESCRIPTION ON COURSE (MINIMUM 500 WORDS)	<p>A negotiated transaction is usually understood as a transaction in which a company seeks to acquire or exit another company, or buy or dispose-off assets, after negotiating the terms of the transaction in advance. This helps to run a more effective due diligence process and build a positive relationship with the target company's management. For the stated reasons, in the past few years, privately negotiated transactions have been preferred over hostile acquisitions.</p> <p>Financial and strategic investments, stake/asset sales, mergers and acquisitions are different forms of negotiated transactions. While every negotiated transaction is a result of commercial arrangement between two or more private parties, its execution should be in compliance with all the laws in force. This requires corporate lawyers/legal advisers to propose a legally compliant transaction structure which is also commercially viable. The proposed elective course, will focus on various general and specific laws regulating such negotiated transactions and the manner in which they are practically implemented.</p> <p>Nuances of transactional practice are best (some believe - 'only') understood while practising, but legal provisions backing such nuances can be explored and understood in class rooms. Therefore, subscribers of the course would be introduced to the practical processes involved in corporate transactions and would be expected to master transactional legal reasoning.</p> <p>Teaching: Mode of teaching will be a blend of lectures and discussions spread over 16 (sixteen) sessions of 1 (one) hour each.</p>

BRIEF DESCRIPTION (MAXIMUM 500 WORDS)	<p>This course focuses on the idea of equality conceptualized in Western Political Philosophy. The primary focus is on the work of John Rawls (A Theory of Justice and Political Liberalism) and Ronald Dworkin (Sovereign Virtue). It then engages with the internal critique, most importantly the capabilities approach by Amartya Sen and Martha Nussbaum, and G.A. Cohen.</p> <p>This discussion was shaken up with Iris Marion Young's powerful critique of ideas of equality/justice that focus on (re)distribution. She argues for making oppression and domination as the sites of conceptualizing justice and equality. Young argues that unequal distribution of public goods is in fact a symptom of systemic oppression. Then, it takes note of the communitarian critique, most notably from Charles Taylor and Michael Sandel, that challenges liberalism for its 'disembodied' or 'atomistic' conception of self and ideas of recognition originating therefrom. Communitarians criticize the acontextualised account of individuals as free and equal parties of a contract that pervades the liberal social imagination. Where people <i>come from</i> (not only geographically but importantly socio-culturally) provides mediates their agency to provide meaning to their choices and identities. It is here Rawls' 'idea of public reason' and overlapping consensus' acquire significance.</p> <p>Finally, we shall try to ground the above discussion in emerging studies of urbanism and creation of cities where the issues of recognition, domination and distribution intersect in non-trivial ways in constructing the cities and its people. This part would engage with issues of segregation, homelessness, movements and exchanges in cities that emerge from histories of deprivation and identities.</p>

BRIEF DESCRIPTION ON COURSE (MAXIMUM 500 WORDS)	<p>This course pertains to an advanced conceptualization of certain constitutional questions. Unlike a typical undergraduate course on constitutional law, this seminar is not a broad overview or survey of various constitutional themes, like specific rights, scope of judicial review, federalism etc. However, it draws upon our preliminary knowledge of these constitutional themes to construct and analyze three dynamic, but complex problems of modern constitutions. Firstly, there is the <u>problem of constitutional design and constitutional founding</u>. This theme reflects upon the challenges of governing a nation's polity with entrenched constraints of constitutions. It requires a functional or purposive conception of constitutions to consider them as instruments serving specific purpose(s). Secondly, the 'written-ness' of modern constitutions (even the unwritten constitution of the United Kingdom operates through written rules, precedents, or statutes) forces the challenge of <u>argumentative culture and interpretation</u>.</p> <p>For the pedagogical purposes, the course can be broadly divided into two modules:</p> <p>Module I: Constitutional Democracy [6 hours]</p> <p>This module introduces students to the various types of relevant literature and modes of analysis prevalent in the field of constitutional law and theory. Specifically, it focuses upon the conceptual challenges of reconciling the demands of constitutionalism (legal constraints) and democracy (political power), and the effects of such reconciliation in the design of constitutions.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> (i) Politico-legal conception of constitutions; (ii) Literature survey & prevalent modes of analysis; (iii) Constitutional rights as the core element of legal constitutionalism;

(iv) Political disagreements and constitutional pre-commitments;

BRIEF DESCRIPTION ON COURSE (MAXIMUM 500 WORDS)	<p>Students of law are not newcomers to state regulation of economic activity. Regulation of economic activity would have been dealt with in courses such as Company Law, Banking Law, Law of Contracts, Property Law, etc. This course, however, takes an interdisciplinary approach to regulation, i.e. as an activity influenced by and influencing the disciplines of law, economics, and political science. The objective of the course is to equip the participant with a macro vision of the way law operates alongside the dynamics of political economy and societal expectations from state. Such an approach helps contextualise the role and limitations of law in regulating economic activity and helps strategise effective regulatory interventions. It endeavors to make the participant aware of the ideological or normative underpinnings and actor motivations informing regulatory interventions.</p> <p>The course will primarily cover the theories of regulation, aspects of regulatory globalisation concerning developing</p>

BRIEF DESCRIPTION ON COURSE (MAXIMUM 500 WORDS)	<p>As law students learning about election laws, our focus is often restricted to doctrines that have been handed down by courts. These doctrines most often only deal with Administrative and Constitutional Law. However, a vast field of election law exists outside of judgements and solely in the political field. India's elections are extremely dynamic and have constantly thrown up difficult challenges for policymakers. For example, regulating the (mis)use of social media during elections. India perhaps became one of the first places where a candidate's deepfake video was used to seek votes.</p> <p>"Election reform" is often used as a catchall phrase to address such challenges. However, it is important for such reforms to be tested against constitutional principles. Since elections are critical to a working constitutional machinery, such tests cannot be in the abstract. They require an adequate understanding of how elections are conducted and how various stakeholders participate in them. As lawyers, we are required to factor in these realities before we evaluate any reform. Furthermore, elections offer a unique space where lawyers have to necessarily work in collaboration with a vast array of professionals/practitioners.</p> <p>The purpose of this elective is to not only understand the big picture but also some of the nitty-gritties of how elections happen in India. Each class will focus on one proposed area of</p>

	<p>election reform. BRIEF DESCRIPTION ON COURSE (MAXIMUM 500 WORDS)	<p>In this elective, we will unpack the types of constitutional law issues that are amenable to resolution before courts, and through it, the types of issues that are not. What, if anything, is the problem with trifurcating the capital city of a recently reorganized state into 3 capitals? What about one-nation-one-election? Why do we not have more smart cities? The effort is to understand the material and structural bases of Indian constitutionalism, and constitutional harms that can be unleashed in that realm, sometimes even without per se violating constitutional text. In doing so, we will explore the limits of doctrinal constitutional law, issues for constitutionalism beyond constitutionality, and understand the "constitution" beyond the "Constitution".</p> <p>Curated materials</p> <p>The curated materials for the elective are:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) For reading: the readings comprising works of other authors, and notes that I have drawn up for you. 2) For viewing: 1 hour of video pre-recorded and circulated, to be watched by you before the class. 3) For reflection: in response to 2-3 prompts ahead of each class. 4) Online class (to be recorded): 1 hour of an online class conducted

	<p>for all students who are able to log in synchronously. NB: 1 hour of pre-circulated video + 1 hour of online class = 2 hours per class. There will be 16 such classes in total.</p> <p>Expectation of each student</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. <u>Constructing your learning objective</u>: Find a socio-political issue or two that affects you, your family, your community or your region ("your project"). The intention in this elective will be for you to construct your own learning objectives. So, in each class, you will construct knowledge about the constitutional aspects of your project by drawing from the curated materials and applying them to your project. Please think of 1 or 2 possible project issues ahead of your first class. 2. <u>Format of online class</u>: For each online class you are expected to have watched the 1 hour of video in advance. When you log in to the online class synchronously with your peers, you will spend the hour attempting to understand the readings and apply them to your project. You will do that by presenting your thoughts in the class, in response to the reflection prompts I will share with you for the class. 3. <u>Enabling access if you are unable to log in</u>: I will also share an excel sheet on google docs with you. If you are unable to log into the class due to internet access issues, you will apply yourselves to the curated materials and your project by answering the reflection prompts on the excel sheet in not more than 200 words per prompt. The idea is to continuously construct your own knowledge by applying your insights from the curated materials to your project. Because the excel sheet will be on googledocs, you may work on it on your own time, when you are able to, even if it is asynchronously from the rest of the class.

Course Title:	Access to knowledge, intellectual property, and human rights

Pre-Requisites:	Students must have completed course requirements for public international law, intellectual property law, and constitutional law. Students must commit to completing the prescribed reading before Wednesday seminars.
Brief Description on Course (Maximum 500 words)	<p>Since the turn of the century, the increasing privatisation of knowledge has placed significant limits on its public access. This has manifested in the form of placing a price on access that only the elite can afford to pay. The global A2K movement arose respond to this crisis. This course considers the legal issues arising from this phenomenon.</p> <p>The course explores contemporary issues of access to knowledge at the intersection of intellectual property and human rights law. It begins with an overview of the international law regimes governing both systems of law, and the interpretive problems that this arrangement poses. It then looks at these norms in their context – what role do international institutions play in the domestic realisation of access to knowledge? The course focuses on two particular problems – the problem of access to educational materials posed by copyright and the problem of access to vaccines and healthcare posed by patents. Both issues acquire contemporary salience during the covid-19 pandemic.</p> <p>The course also invites students to understand the relationship between the international obligations undertaken by states to enable access to knowledge, and how states' domestic legal frameworks interact with these obligations. At the conclusion of the course, students will gain a deeper understanding of how and where international law is made and the important role of domestic law in this process. Students will also study pressing contemporary challenges that are facing the global South and the world at large and to what extent law can help to resolve these issues.</p> <p>The course is reading-intensive and requires students to read before every seminar.</p>
